In order to contribute to its achievement, AFD is focusing on three main strategic lines:

- Improving access to water and sanitation in urban areas
- Enhancing protection of the water resource
- Building capacities of the water services utilities in managing their networks and services

Our financing 2009 – 2020 in Kisumu:

1

Improving Access to Water & Sanitation in Kisumu

- Three sovereign loans of EUR 59 million over 20 years.
- Cofinancing: Delegated grant (EUR 5 million from the EU to AFD), EIB loan (EUR 35 million), counterpart from the Government of Kenya (EUR 10 million).
- ✓ Rehabilitation of the water intake on Lake Victoria.
- ✓ Rehabilitation of the Dunga treatment plant.
- ✓ Rehabilitation and extension of the water treatment plant in Kajulu.
- ✓ Rehabilitation and extension of the sanitation systems (Kisat waste water treatment plant, Nyalenda ponds, sewerage system).
- ✓ Capacity building of the Lake Victoria South Water Works Development Agency and Kisumu Water and Sanitation Company (KIWASCO), operators in charge of water and sanitation.
- ✓ Extension of the drinking water network in disadvantaged neighborhoods.
- ✓ Extension of the Kisumu water and sewerage network.
- ✓ Construction of a new wastewater treatment plant in Otonglo.
- ✓ Establishment of a system to monitor water quality on Lake Victoria.

Our financing 2009 – 2020 in other parts of Kenya:

Improving Access to Water & Sanitation in Nairobi

- Sovereign loan: EUR 100 million over 20 years.
- ✓ Reinforcement and extension of the water distribution network.
- ✓ Extension of the sewerage network.
- ✓ Improving access to water and sanitation in informal settlements.
- ✓ Capacity building of the operator and fight against non-revenue water.

2

Increasing the amount of drinking water serving Nairobi

- Sovereign loan: EUR 100 million over 20 years.
- ✓ Kigoro treatment plant (150,000 m³/day).
- ✓ Transfer pipes for raw water to Kigoro and treated water from Kigoro to Nairobi.
- ✓ Improvement and extension of Nairobi's drinking water distribution network with the operator.
- ✓ Sanitation in Nairobi's informal settlements.

Improving Access to Water & Sanitation in Nairobi's Informal Settlements

- Grant: EUR 1 million.
- ✓ Improving access to sanitation and hygiene in the large informal settlements of Mukuru and Mathare, with Fresh Life Initiative and its dry toilet system.
- ✓ Construction and installation of nearly 900 dry toilets and their operation for two years.
- ✓ Training in anti-COVID best-practices (the toilets are equipped in series with a hand washing point).

Improving Access to Water & Sanitation in Mombasa

- Two sovereign loans of EUR 160 million
- ✓ Mwache treatment plant
- ✓ Transmission lines to Mombasa
- ✓ Distribution and sanitation in Mombasa
- ✓ Technical assistance to the operator MOWASSCO
